

**REPORT (ABRIDGED) BY THE COMMONWEALTH AND
IMMIGRATION OMBUDSMAN FOR TABLING IN PARLIAMENT**

Under s 486O of the Migration Act 1958

This is the first s 486O report on Mr X and Ms Y who remained in restricted immigration detention for more than 24 months (two years).

Detention history

19 August 2013	Mr X and Ms Y were detained under s 189(3) of the <i>Migration Act 1958</i> after arriving in Australia aboard Suspected Illegal Entry Vessel 836 <i>Trinity</i> .
3 December 2015	Granted Bridging visas and released from restricted detention.

Visa applications/case progression

The Department of Immigration and Border Protection advised that prior to being released from detention, Mr X and Ms Y were part of a cohort who had not had their protection claims assessed as they arrived in Australia after 13 August 2012 and the Minister had not lifted the bar under s 46A.

Health and welfare

Mr X did not require treatment for any major physical or mental health issues.

Ms Y was provided with treatment for a range of physical health issues including gestational diabetes.

Ombudsman assessment/recommendation

Mr X and Ms Y were granted Bridging visas on 3 December 2015 and released from immigration detention.

The Ombudsman notes that Mr X and Ms Y were held in detention for over two years before being granted Bridging visas. The Ombudsman further notes that, at the time of DIBP's review, processing of their claims for protection had not commenced.

The Ombudsman recommends that the Minister lift the bar under s 46A and processing of the family's protection claims commence as soon as possible.
